

**CITY OF WILDOMAR
CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES
JULY 22, 2009**

The regular meeting of July 22, 2009, of the Wildomar City Council was called to order by Mayor Farnam at 7:03 p.m.

Roll Call showed the following Council Members in attendance: Mayor Farnam, Mayor Pro Tem Moore, Council Members Ade, and Cashman; Council Member Swanson was absent.

The Flag Salute was led by Mayor Pro Tem Moore.

Presentations

This being the City's first code enforcement update since taking over from the County, Code Enforcement Officer Kowalski gave her background and experience and then presented a brief report on code enforcement activities.

Veronica Langworthy, City of Wildomar's appointment to the Riverside County Free Library Advisory Committee, thanked the Council for appointing her to the Committee and then gave a quarterly update.

Public Comments

Sharon Heil, resident, stated the weed problem and fire hazard is very high and she gave a list of the problems in her area and along the freeway. She is asking for code enforcement and the Fire Department to check these properties and get compliance.

Henry Silvestre, resident, stated the next Chamber breakfast will be on August 5 and invited the City Council and citizens to attend.

Ronald Havig, resident, stated he lives on Bundy Canyon Road and on December 28, 2008 he was in a very serious car accident. He was told that something was going to be done about the road, and to date nothing has occurred. There have been numerous accidents and something needs to be done.

Gina Castanon, resident, stated she attended a Planning Director hearing on a project across from her. The hearing did not go the way she had wanted so she asked to have it appealed. She found out it would cost her \$900 and she feels it is unjust. She doesn't feel she should have to pay to have the Planning

Commission and/or City Council to hear an issue of concern to the community. She feels there should be a waiver.

Assistant Planning Director Hogan stated that in most cases it is a deposit, however for an appeal, it is a fixed fee. The \$964 would only cover a small cost of preparing the staff report and noticing for the public hearing. He added that Staff would have to be directed to deviate from this procedure.

Council Member Cashman stated he would like the public to know about this item. This would make the Brown Act apply to the State.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Mayor Farnam to adopt Resolution No. 09-49.

Council Member Ade stated she agrees with Council Member Cashman and feels this needs to apply to the State to stop the backroom politics.

Council Member Cashman stated this applies to the State IOUs and makes the State take them as payment for any monies owed to them.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to approve a Letter of Support for AB1506.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

- 1 K. Approve the Animal Field Services and Sheltering Agreement between the City of Wildomar and Animal Friends of the Valley, in the amount of not to

exceed \$90,000 per year (\$7,500.00 per month) and authorize the City Manager to sign the required documents to initiate the agreement.

George Taylor, resident, stated this company works hard and he is hoping the City Council will approve the agreement.

Finance Director Nordquist gave a brief staff report stating the City went out to bid and Animal Friends of the Valley was much lower in cost and is local.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore inquired if the "not to exceed \$90,000" should be inserted on page 13, viii.

Finance Director Nordquist stated the contract is a not to exceed \$90,000.

Council Member Cashman stated he would like to know the cost if the City collected the revenue fees and paid them against the contract amount.

Finance Director Nordquist stated there are three options: 1) Split servicing, where the County would provide field services and Animal Friends provide the shelter, the cost would be \$142,000; Riverside County only would be \$287,000; Animal Friends of the Valley only would be \$90,000.

Council Member Ade stated she asked Staff why the County was so much higher. She was told they were offering three more hours of service per day and we would have to pay a portion of the cost of building their new shelter in San Jacinto.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to approve the Animal Field Services and Sheltering Agreement between the City of Wildomar and Animal Friends of the Valley, in the amount of not to exceed \$90,000 per year (\$7,500.00 per month) and authorize the City Manager to sign the required documents to initiate the agreement.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

2. PUBLIC HEARINGS

Mayor Farnam opened the public hearing.

Judy Watterlond, Riverside County Transportation Department, presented the staff report stating this does reflect a 2% inflation increase for the appropriate zones for the coming fiscal year.

There being no speakers, Mayor Farnam closed the public hearing.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to adopt Resolution No. 09-48.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

2 B. Southern California Edison Franchise

Mayor Farnam opened the Public Hearing.

City Engineer Kashawagi presented the staff report stating this is similar to the agreement they had with the County, however this establishes a direct relationship with the City.

Viet Tran, SCE Region Manager, thanked the City Council for considering the franchise.

There being no speakers, Mayor Farnam closed the public hearing.

City Clerk Lee read the title of the Ordinance:

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to adopt Ordinance No. 33.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

3. GENERAL BUSINESS

- 3 A. Consideration and Possible Approval of Contract for City Manager; and Possible Appointment of City Manager.

Assistant City Manager Fitzwater stated the process started with the committee of Mayor Pro Tem Moore and Council Member Ade interviewing seven candidates. From that, the top three candidates were then interviewed by the entire City Council on July 7 in closed session. As a result of that interview, one individual stood out. He then gave the background and accomplishments of the top candidate.

Council Member Ade thanked Mayor Pro Tem Moore for taking the time with the process. She was looking for a candidate that would stand out, and she is pleased that it did happen with this candidate. She also thanked the entire City Council for the closed session interviews. She then introduced Frank Oveido, the candidate for the City Manager position.

Mr. Oviedo thanked the City Council for the entire interview process. He stated he is excited about coming to Wildomar and looks forward to working with the City Council, the Staff and the community.

Mayor Farnam stated this is an amazing, dynamic individual.

City Attorney Biggs stated the terms of the City Manager's contract have been negotiated and are included in the packet.

Council Member Cashman stated he wanted to see someone in the position who could handle the various tasks before him and who would see the bigger picture. He feels Mr. Oviedo is the man.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Cashman, to approve the contract for City Manager and to appoint Frank Oviedo as the City Manager for the City of Wildomar.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

At 7:54 p.m. the City Council took a recess.

At 8:10 p.m. the City Council reconvened into open session, with Council Member Swanson absent.

- 3 B. Consideration of Council Sponsored Initiative Measures to be Submitted to the Electorate in a Special Election to be Consolidated with the November, 2009 General Election Relating to the Manner in Which Members of the City Council are Elected.

City Attorney Biggs presented the staff report stating this was done in accordance with the direction from Council. She went over the three options to be presented to the voters. She explained it is the Measure which gets the highest number of affirmative votes that will be put in place. If they are all defeated then the elections will stay by district in accordance with Ordinance No. 31.

Kristan Lloyd, resident, stated at incorporation this issue wasn't really discussed. She is in support of the special election as she feels no one was very educated on this. She feels LAFCO should be liable for the cost of this election. She has concerns about the districts because it is based on the census numbers and not registered voters. Additionally, the districts would have to be revisited after the 2010 census, and that would be another cost.

City Clerk Lee advised that she did receive five emails from residents who would like to voice their support of at-large.

George Taylor, resident, stated he attended the community forums regarding the districting. He lives in the Farm and they would have to include a lot of surrounding areas to get a population count of 6,000 in the district. He feels the City is much too small to be in districts. He would like to see the question back on the ballot and go back to at-large.

Henry Silvestre, resident, stated he is for at-large and not districts. He asked if the City could save some money if the citizens petitioned for this versus the City calling the election.

City Attorney Biggs stated the election would still cost the same, and possibly more and it would still be open to a legal challenge.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated that during the incorporation election there was an argument submitted for the districts. The Registrar of Voters sent a letter to Council Member Cashman at his residence address, where he does not have mail delivery, and not his post office box, so the letter was not received. When the rebuttals were due she was there with the rebuttal and the Registrar's Office refused to accept it since they had not submitted an argument. That is why there was no argument in the voter pamphlet during the incorporation election. She supports putting this question back on the ballot, especially in light of the community forums that National Demographics has done regarding the election systems.

Mayor Farnam agreed and feels it is best for the community and feels the City is too small for districts. His concern is that the State is going to take money away from the City for the State's budget and he has to weigh what is best for the community in light of this. He is personally in favor of at-large but is wondering if this should be tabled until next week when Council Member Swanson is back. He is worried about the money the election will cost, and the possible legal challenge.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated the money is in the 2009-10 budget for this election.

City Attorney Biggs stated the last legal challenge, which was regarding districting, was about \$25,000 and it was a more complicated issue than this one. She does not anticipate this would be a \$500,000 case.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated the City has received several letters, emails, phone calls, and speakers in support of at-large, has the City received anything supporting districts.

City Clerk Lee answered the City has not received anything in support of districts.

Council Member Cashman stated the Council has looked at this question and discussed it several times. He feels the citizens need to vote on it.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated that Council Member Swanson made her wishes known at the last Council meeting.

Council Member Ade stated she feels the Council should represent the

whole community and the citizens should be able to go to five people and not just one. The decisions made at the Council affect the whole community, and the budget is for the entire City and not one district. She feels the Council needs to move forward with this.

A MOTION was made by Council Member Cashman, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, to adopt Resolution No. 09-52.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 3; Nays – 0; Abstain – 1 (Farnam); Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

City Attorney Biggs presented the staff report stating this item sets out the procedures for arguments and rebuttals. The Council would appoint a committee of one or two members to write the arguments and, if approved by the Council, the rebuttals.

A MOTION was made, and amended, by Council Member Cashman, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, to adopt Resolution No. 09-53 and to appoint two Council Members to write the arguments and rebuttals to all of the three Measures; and to appoint the City Manager and City Attorney to review the arguments and rebuttals.

Discussion ensued regarding the timeline to for arguments and rebuttals.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 09 - 53

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Mayor Farnam, to appoint Council Members Ade and Cashman to write the arguments and rebuttals to all three Measures.

City Attorney Biggs advised that the authors will need to take a position as to whether the Council is for or against each Measure.

The consensus of the City Council is in favor of at-large and against by district and from district.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Farnam, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, to adopt Resolution No. 09-54.

- 3 D. Consider Authorizing the Mayor, on Behalf of the City, to Send a Letter in Support of AB18 to Local California Assembly and Senate Representatives.

City Attorney Biggs presented the staff report stating AB18 is in regards to the discrepancy in the law regarding if elections are at-large or if by districts and as to how many members are up for election at either election. AB18 resolves this stating two members will be up for election at either an at-large or district election. This letter would be in support of AB18.

Discussion ensued regarding the confusion in the present law.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to send a Letter in Support of AB18 to local California Assembly and Senate representatives.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

- 3 E. Discussion and Direction Regarding the Preparation of a Weed Abatement Ordinance for the City.

City Attorney Biggs presented the staff report stating this is a comparison of the City of Lake Elsinore's ordinance with the County's and is the beginning of the process. There was discussion regarding enhancing the code enforcement aspect, but to keep in mind that it has a price tag associated with it. It is a very aggressive program and appears to be effective.

City Engineer Kashawagi stated he did meet with the City of Lake Elsinore to discuss the program they have there. He then outlined how the process is done there each year. The only issue they could not answer was what the net cost to the General Fund is.

Discussion ensued regarding efforts being done in the City and how it could be more effective; Environmental issues; and Absentee landowners.

Gina Castanon, resident, stated for the last seven years she has reported the 50+ acres across from her and the property next to her for weed and trash abatement. She stated she would hold the City responsible if a fire occurs and affects her home.

- 3 F. Report Regarding County of Riverside Owned Properties Located Within

the City of Wildomar.

City Engineer Kashawagi presented the staff report stating Staff has visited the properties. The park properties are currently in process of being transferred to the City. The remaining properties were reviewed and reported in the staff report.

Discussion ensued regarding the 83 acre gravel yard on Bundy Canyon and discussing it with the County; More information on the vacant land for a park.

Council consensus to direct Staff to discuss the properties with the County to receive more information on the gravel yard, the park land and remnant pieces.

3 G. Open Fire Permit Proclamation

Battalion Chief Beach presented the staff report stating on an annual basis the Fire Chief will issue a proclamation prohibiting open fires in the County during the summer fire season. Because of the rural nature of the City he feels this should be looked at.

A MOTION was made by Mayor Pro Tem Moore, seconded by Council Member Ade, to adopt the Open Fire Permit Proclamation.

Roll call vote: Ayes – 4; Nays – 0; Absent – 1 (Swanson). Motion carried.

CITY MANAGER REPORT

City Manager Danielson stated there is some good news regarding SBA 21 Bike and Pedestrian Grant Program administered annually by the County. The City submitted a proposal on May 1 to RCTC, of which 38 proposals were received. Wildomar's request was ranked #2 of all the proposals and we were awarded the entire requested amount of \$186,760 to allow construction of 1,900 linear feet of new sidewalks for pedestrian and bike safety to Wildomar Elementary and Reagan Elementary. He then gave kudos to City Engineer Kashawagi and his Staff.

CITY ATTORNEY REPORT

Nothing to report.

COUNCIL COMMUNICATIONS

Council Member Ade reported she attended the concert in the park last week. She felt it was a good turnout and was enjoyable. She is very happy that Wildomar can finally have events like this. She gave kudos to everyone involved in the program and getting the parks in the City.

Mayor Pro Tem Moore agreed with Council Member Ade and reported there were about 75 people in attendance. She reported on the upcoming events in the park. She attended the monthly League of California Cities Division dinner last week. The City also had the fourth emergency summit with one new church with the faith base organizations. She attended the Library meeting where they reported that over 400 kids have enrolled in the summer reading program. They had an animal presentation and over 300 kids attended, so they had to split it up into two sessions. The residents of Wildomar came out last Saturday to show support for PFC Gideon who was killed in Afghanistan. He was from Murrieta, however the service was held at Cornerstone church in Wildomar. She also attended a conference earlier in the day in Anaheim regarding the use of stimulus monies.

Mayor Farnam stated he has received emails and calls regarding residents in the City that have the Lake Elsinore zip code mailing address. He would like Staff to discuss this with the Post Master. He received an email regarding updates on crime. Some cities do have local papers that report these types of things, usually in a weekly local paper. He would like to see if this could be done on a weekly, or bi-weekly basis.

Police Chief Cleary stated that the information can be found on crimereports.com.

Mayor Farnam stated he has received emails from local bars stating they feel they are being targeted by the Police for drunk driving.

Police Chief Cleary stated they are not being targeted.

FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Mayor Pro Tem Moore stated there is a new Librarian at Mission Trail Library and she would like her to come to a Council meeting to introduce herself, and also have the Friends of Mission Trail Library give an update.

Mayor Farnam announced the First Inaugural Mayors Ball will be held on

Saturday, September 19 with a Dr. Seuss theme. The proceeds of the event will go to Wishes for Children Foundation. This will be an annual event and each Mayor will select a charity that they wish the proceeds to go to.
